

## INTRODUCTION TO THE COMMON LAW COURSE

This course is ideal for law students and legal practitioners wanting to develop a strong understanding of a **system of law** which is used in the **USA** and the **UK**, including many other countries around the world.

The focus is on developing a true understanding of a system of law which clearly separates civil from criminal law. This has a strong influence on the way in which law students in the common law are trained at law schools across the UK and the USA.

Knowing how to recognize this separation, helps students to **use legal terminology accurately** when dealing with different scenarios. These include learning how to cite **precedents** when representing clients in and out of court and to develop the skill of advocacy. **Advocacy** is the skill of speaking in front of a judge in court.

Understanding the vocabulary that is used in litigation can open the doors to students who are looking to have more confidence when interviewing English speaking clients or when attending an **LLM**.
